Machine Applique—Polly Duggan



Polly has been applique quilting using fusible for over 30 years.

The first fusible she used was stitch witchery.

Polly's first applique class was a MQA class in 2005 with Sue Nichols and Pat Holly (sisters) at St. Marks.

How Polly likes to applique -

- Starch background on the back, so not to interfere with fusible adhesion on the front of fabric
- Trace pattern onto fusible
- Cut out pattern and center of shape, making a donut in the fusible
- Follow fusible instructions (they all differ)
- Make sure fusible is all the way to the edge of the shape
- Score backing with a pin if having problems with removing it
- Fuse onto background fabric
- Stitch around shape with statin stitch or button hole stitch
- Match top and bottom threads
- Use Open Toe foot
- Stitch close to edge of applique
- Adjust stitch lengths at ends of shape (making smaller at points of applique shape)
- With curves, rotate with needle on outside of shape
- Recommends Microtex needles (sharp needles)



Twelve Top Tips for Machine Applique

- 1. **KISS!** Keep it simple Sewer! Start with a simple pattern, hopefully symmetrical so you don't have worry about reversing it.
- 2. **Keep a still upper lip!** Well, prepare you background fabric for easier handling.
- 3. **Stick with it!** Find a fusible product that works for you, and be sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- 4. You light up my life! Come up with your own good idea for a light box!
- 5. Let's get edgy! Be sure your fusible goes all the way to the edge of your applique.
- 6. **Time to make donuts!** Cut away the center part of your piece of fusible makes your product less stiff and save on fusible.
- 7. **Score one for the home team!** Score the paper back with a pin for easier removal.
- 8. **Don't step on my toes!** Well, at least don't stitch on YOUR foot! Use an open toe foot for better visibility.
- 9. **Watch your step!** Actually, it is your stitch you are watching. Position it right at the edge of your applique piece for a better finished product.
- 10. **Danger, curves ahead!** Curves are tricky but just remember ALWAYS stop with your needle down at the right of the stitch, on the outside edge. Otherwise you end up with V's and not a true blanket stitch.
- 11. **Tying up loose ends...**use an "easy threading needle" to pull ends to back and slide under the row of stitching if your background fabric is a light color.

Tip from the audience—store your Wonder Under (fusible product) in a Ziplock bag with a "silicon" package that comes inside handbags and shoe boxes to keep fresh.
